Special Guest from Missouri

Tuesday, August 1, Jim Baker, Site
Administrator of the Felix Valle State
Historic Site in Ste. Genevieve, Missouri
visited Louisbourg and gave a talk on
French Colonial architecture. Several people
from Asset Management, Heritage
Presentation, Cultural Resources and a few
very interested visitors attended. His talk,
"To learn the trade, art and mystery of a
carpenter and house joiner...": Traditional
French-Colonial Architecture of Ste.
Genevieve," gave the history of the
development of the particular style of
architecture found in Missouri.

The talk was illustrated with examples of many buildings still standing, some museums and some private homes, in Ste. Genevieve. Ste Genevieve has numerous significant buildings dating from the late 18th and early 19th centuries, built in both the poteaux-en-terre and poteaux-sur-solle styles. These distinctive French colonial styles are also used in many of the buildings at_Louisbourg, such as the fisherman's house and the Grandchamps Inn and restaurant. This architecture provides a concrete example of the link, through French colonial history, between Louisbourg and the American south.

As well as giving the talk Jim took the time

to visit Louisbourg twice during his stay. He was very impressed with the construction details of our buildings and our presentation of the site. He enjoyed his time in Nova Scotia (he was also speaking in Chester) tremendously.

Common Moorhen Sighting

The Common Moorhen, which rarely gets this far north - Connecticut normally being the nearest it gets to Louisbourg. It was seen in the second small pond on the right, along the road out to Rochefort Point. It is a

marsh/pond bird that looks a lot like an American Coot, but smaller - it is blackish with a

bright red bill, white under the tail and a line of white along its side. It pumps its neck back and forth as it swims. Becki Duggan saw it at the end of June but



didn't know what it was until Susann Myers identified it for us.

Ordinarily, the Fortress might expect to get 20 to 30 visitors coming just to see this bird, since so many birders from all over North America are here to see the Western Reef Heron in Glace Bay.
