ICM Training

On December 12th and 13th staff of the Fortress of Louisbourg, including members of the unionmanagement committee, attended a two-day workshop on the Informal Conflict Management program at Parks Canada. Paulette Melanson, the ICM advisor for the eastern region, facilitated the course for managers and supervisors and union representatives. The session provided detail about the policy and its application as well as skills in communication and dealing with conflict. This program, a joint union-management initiative, complements existing formal dispute resolution mechanisms in the agency.

Those who attended took part in a variety of interactive training sessions and had a chance to apply all of the skills they learned and to discuss these with their colleagues. Anne Marie Lane Jonah and Anna Marie Cormier, who will be providing one-day workshops on ICM for the Fortress staff, also had a chance to instruct sections of the course and try out the skills they acquired at a facilitators' course in Ottawa last September. Many who attended commented that the skills and the information were useful, and the opportunity to practice new skills was helpful. FOL staff always welcome the chance to get together with colleagues from different sections, making for a pleasant experience for all.

Anne Marie and Anna Marie will start offering sessions in ICM for FOL staff in the New Year.
