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# And the anchor moved ...

In early July, the large anchor on display at the Visitor Reception Centre was moved to front of the building. It has provided the front with a much-needed focal point. It also recalls the importance of the Louisbourg's maritime roots and a time when the harbour was busy with large merchant and naval sailing ships.

The metal part of the anchor is made of wrought iron and was retrieved from Louisbourg harbour in 1926. The wooden stock is a reproduction made by our Artisan Shop. As anchor design remained relatively unchanged for many years, it is impossible to precisely date this anchor. It has been identified as the sheet (or main) anchor of a large sailing ship.

To quote *Falconer's Marine Dictionary*, (1780), " [anchors] are composed of a shank, a stock, a ring and two arms with their flukes. The stock, which is a long piece of timber fixed across the shank, serves to guide the flukes in a direction perpendicular to the surface of the ground; so that one of them sinks into it by its own weight as soon as it falls, and

is still preserved steadily in that position by the stock, which, together with the shank, lies flat on the bottom. In this situation it must necessarily sustain a great effort, before it can by dragged through the earth horizontally. ...Every ship, has or ought to have, three principal anchors, with a cable to each, viz. the sheet, *maitresse-ancre*, ... the best bower, *second ancre*, and the small bower, *ancre d'assourche*, so called from their usual situation on the ship's bows. There are besides smaller anchors, for removing a ship from place to place





in a harbour, or river, where there may not be room or wind for sailing ..."

In the above description, please remember that in the 18-th century, a ship referred to a three-masted vessel with square rigging on all three masts. In consequence, the writer was referring to the large merchant and naval ships of the day having three large anchors, and not to the numerous rigs of smaller vessels.

Thanks are due to the Groundskeepers, Masons, Operators and Artisans for their work in site-preparation and the move of the anchor and to Conservation and Archaeology for their advice.

# Compostable Material Now Banned From Landfill

The Cape Breton Regional Municipality composting facility is now up and running. As a result, the CBRM is no longer accepting compostable material in the garbage collection system.

Although FOLNHSC already has a comprehensive "back yard" composting program in place, much of the material now considered compostable is not suitable for these units. Currently all grass clippings, garden waste, animal manure, vegetable peelings, coffee grounds etc. go into the compost stream. The material is collected from various locations and put into large piles where it turns into compost. This material is then used back on site in the gardens program. To make the collection of material easier, biodegradable kitchen compost bags have been provided by Asset Management and are available from Stores.

The challenge now is to capture the remaining compostable material that is currently going into the waste stream. Compostable material like table scraps, food waste, used paper towels, fish, bones, and meat and dairy products from lunchrooms, site restaurants, day use areas and beaches must now be diverted to the compost stream.

Recently, representatives the CBRM Solid Waste Management Committee and ACAP Cape Breton gave a presentation on the new CBRM Composting Program to Fortress site supervisors. Later, the three met with members of the FOL Green Committee to discuss the challenges associated with complying with the legislation. The group toured the restaurant and met with manager, Anne Marie Pitcher, to come up with some solutions and plans for action.

The group recognized the efforts of FOLNHSC staff and extended a "thank you" to staff members who reduce, reuse, recycle and compost. These efforts will result in a reduction in tipping fees and a cost saving for the Site. Money saved can then be spent on the infrastructure and operation of the Site. Please do your part to keep compostables out of the garbage.

Excerpt from a letter written by Mrs. Alexander Graham Bell to her motherin-law Mrs. Alexander Melville Bell, sent from Baddeck, July 21<sup>st</sup>, 1887:

"It is a perfectly lovely day here and Alec is happy and busy all day long, rowing, fishing or working in his kitchen garden. His arms have grown so strong now that he can row all day long without fatigue ...

Alec is full of plans for this place, and so well and vigorous it would please you to see him, and he is longing to show himself and his home to you and his father. Your room is ready for you whenever you will come and we want you very much. Alec, Mr. Sumichrast, Mr. Kiezel and Mr. McCurdy have gone to Margaree for a couple of days fishing and hope to bring back a salmon. I'm rather glad he is away for it gives me a chance to get my house in order, a pretty difficult feat with him around.

Alec has had his yacht Alexandrea repainted and it is as pretty as possible and the pride of his heart, and he and Mr. Kiezel are going off in it for a few days cruise next week.

Goodnight. I find weeding in the kitchen garden steadily for nearly four hours this afternoon has left me tired and quite ready for bed. Come soon and see how nice everything here is.

## Silver Dart Centennial Association

The Silver Dart Centennial Association (SDCA) was very pleased to learn that a national level secretariat has been

established to coordinate and facilitate the 2009 Centennial of Powered Flight in Canada under the leadership of Gaston Cloutier, a retired general officer of the Canadian Air Force.

The SDCA is working toward a calendar of events for the 2009 centennial as well as a legacy project to build a 'Hall of Flight' at AGBNHSC to house a full scale replica of Silver Dart and other flight related exhibits.

On July 9<sup>th</sup>, the SDCA met with Mr. Cloutier; Don Pearsons, Director of Air Force Heritage and History and past president of the Canadian Aeronautics and Space Institute; John Orr, formerly of the Canadian Air Force; and Bryan Nelson.
