#### Trailblazers!

Construction is almost complete at the new trail to Wolfe's Redoubt thanks to the hard working effort of Asset Management staff, namely Cheryl Hutt, Andy Ganaway, John Bagnell, Philip Burke, and several others who helped with the many tasks required to create a new trail.

Work involved weeks of tree clearing, chipping, pulling stumps, laying the 175m long gravel path, tamping, and installing a culvert and path over the roadside ditch. The trail, located across from Parking Lot 5 at the Visitor Reception Centre, is scheduled for opening in June 2008, during the 250<sup>th</sup> anniversary of the second siege of Louisbourg, and things appear to be moving along – right on schedule!

Wolfe's redoubt is a field fortification constructed by the British during the 1758 siege of Louisbourg. This field fort, a 30m x 30 m square-shaped earthwork, provided a defensive retreat for the soldiers stationed at gun batteries that fired on French warships in the Louisbourg Harbour. The gun batteries lay south of the redoubt, overlooking the harbour, and the soldiers camped to the north side of the redoubt, on the other side of a small stream. Brigadier-General Wolfe commanded the soldiers in this position, thus the redoubt is called Wolfe's Redoubt.

The British constructed about ten redoubts during the 1758 siege; they were located throughout the extensive British siege works, all the way from Freshwater Brook to Gun Landing Cove.

This is the first time a siege site has been opened for public visitation at Louisbourg.









Panel interpretation will be placed along the route to the redoubt and at the redoubt site itself so, while strolling along the path, everyone has an opportunity to learn about this surprisingly well-preserved siege work and it's role in the Louisbourg story.
