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Health & Safety Day, 2008

The third annual Health & Safety Day was held at the Fortress of Louisbourg NHS on September 18, 2008. The theme for 2008 was "Hazard Prevention". Guest speaker for this event was Nancy MacLean, Atlantic Health & Safety Representative with Public Service Alliance of Canada.

Health & Safety Day was started with a welcome and remarks from our Field Unit Superintendent, Chip Bird. Following this, he presented several Safety Award Certificates to employees who were chosen by the Occupational Health and Safety Committee, for carrying out their duties in a safe and efficient manner, thereby ensuring the health and safety of their co-workers. Recipients included the Ambulance Procedures committee (Ruby Fougere, Alex Campbell, Karen Pink, Ian Harte and Jim Clements); Site Waterline Repair (Utilities and Excavations crews); Fire Extinguisher Project (Fire/Watchstaff); VRC Workstation Improvement (Heritage Presentation and Asset Management staff); Destouches Roof project (Carpentry and Masonry crews); Road Maintenance (Roads & Grounds crews). Nancy MacLean presented an overview of Part XIX, Hazard Prevention Programs, from the Canada Occupational Health and Safety Regulations (Canada Labour Code, Part II).

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She spoke on the importance of not only identifying hazards in the workplace, but ensuring that any hazards, accidents or nearmisses are reported and corrected; also, the roles and responsibilities of various groups,(unions, employees, employers, policy committees, labour officers and workplace OHS committees) in workplace health and safety and also discussed the components of an Hazard Prevention Program.

Nancy's presentation was followed with the video "Remember Charlie". This is Charlie Morecraft's dramatic story in which he talks about his journey from death's door following a refinery explosion, to his position as the world's leading presenter on why we all should follow safety procedures precisely.

On behalf of the Occupational Health and Safety Committee, I would like to thank management for their support of this event and a special thank you to the employees who attended our third Health & Safety Day.

Cultural Resource Management Along the North Shore

As everyone is aware, alder growth along the North Shore adjacent to Route 22 continues to be a problem. As the alders grow and the root



structures expand, the Level 1 cultural resources are damaged and displaced. Since these resources represent the Site's national historic significance, active management is required to ensure that they are not impacted.

Later this week, three members of the La Mauricie National Park fire crew will be on site to begin the process of cutting the alders. These crews routinely travel to parks and sites requiring vegetation management and forest fuel modification.

An environmental assessment for the project has been completed in order to ensure that the activity will not adversely impact the cultural and natural resources. Strategies for the longterm management of the area, including a return to prescribed burning, are currently being examined.



The Louisbourg Symposium

The Louisbourg 2008 Symposium, commemorating the second siege of Louisbourg, was a tremendous success. Researchers from Ontario, Quebec, New Brunswick and New York states, as well as the Fortress, shared their findings and insights with teachers, education students and Louisbourg enthusiasts from Cape Breton, mainland Nova Scotia and New Brunswick. HSMBC Plaques

The proposed Stanley Thompson and Canso Causeway Historic Sites and Monuments Board of Canada plaque unveiling ceremonies will be rescheduled for dates in 2009. It is anticipated there will be a third HSMBC plaque unveiling ceremony in 2009 on February 23rd to commemorate "The First Airplane Flight in Canada".

Tourism Partnership Council

The Tourism Partnership Council of Nova Scotia met in our area (Big Baddeck at Crown Jewel Resort) on September 25th and 26th. We were the venue for a late afternoon reception on the 25th for the group in our main theatre. A group of 110 passengers from the National Geographic cruise ship 'World Explorer' visited AGBNHSC on Saturday, September 20th. The ship docked in North Sydney as timing did not allow for a cruise in to the Bras d'Or Lakes and Baddeck. They were accompanied by Gilbert Grosvenor, former editor of National Geographic magazine, great grandson of Alexander Graham and Mabel Bell and grandson of Gilbert Grosvenor Sr. who married Elsie Bell. The ship docked in North Sydney and passengers boarded buses with one of our HP staff on each bus to provide interpretation along the way to the museum. While half of the passengers toured the museum the other half enjoyed a sail on Baddeck Bay and the opportunity to view Beinn Bhreagh from close to the shoreline and vice versa.

Alexander Graham Bell was the National Geographic Society's second president taking that role on after the death of his father-in-law Gardiner Greene Hubbard. Bell is credited with providing the direction for "transforming the magazine into a bright, interesting, nontechnical periodical that would recruit members from the public" (Robert Bruce, BELL Alexander Graham Bell and the *Conquest of Solitude*) at a time when subscriptions were lagging. Bell's son-in-law to be, Gilbert Grosvenor, became National Geographic Magazine's first full-time employee and editor in 1899. As Robert Bruce writes, the magazine "needed the full time of a vigorous, intelligent editor, whose monthly salary of a hundred dollars Bell offered to underwrite for a year. The Board accepted the offer, whereupon Bell (aided by Elsie's presence in Washington) persuaded young Gilbert Grosvenor to quit his New Jersey

teaching job and on April 1, 1899, become the National Geographic society's first full-time employee."
